Community agents work with others to live their best lives. Community agents like navigators, community health workers, and peer support specialists help others find health services, resources, and connections. Training costs to become a community agent range from free to full university tuition. Sometimes, your employer will cover this cost.

NAVIGATOR

Training

- 5 hours required training
- Up to 15 hours of optional additional training
- Certification exam at the end of each course

Areas of Practice

- Main purpose is to guide consumers though health insurance navigation and the healthcare marketplace
- Core competencies are customer support and service coordination

Organizations

- Find Navigators at Federally Qualified Healthcare Centers, CAP Offices, and Family Resource Centers such as <u>Valleywise.</u>
- Training is typically done inhouse by one's employer



COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER

Training

- 960 hours of combined training and/or practice experience
- High school degree or equivalent
- Certification is valid for 5 years

Areas of Practice

 Ten core competencies are communication, assessment, knowledge-based practice, professional conduct, outreach, advocacy, service coordination, capacity building, relationship building, and education and facilitation

Organizations

- Find CHWs or Promotoras at

- Training is facilitated by the Arizona Community Health Workers Association (AzCHOW) and Arizona State University

PEER & RECOVERY SUPPORT SPECIALIST

Training

- Average training is 40 hours
- Lived experience in behavioral health or substance use recovery is required

Areas of Practice

- Using personal experience of recovery, peer support specialists help guide others toward recovery and support positive environments
- SAMHSA's core competencies are recovery-focused environments, person-centered care, voluntary participation, relationship building, and trauma-informed approaches.
